Keynote Speakers:

<u>Dr Wenche Schrøder Bjorbækmo</u> is a researcher in the program FYSIOPRIM (Physiotherapy in Primary Care) at the Department of Health Science, University of Oslo. Her background is in physiotherapy, and the topic of her PhD thesis was experiences of moving in children with disabilities. Her research interests include phenomenological research approaches, body and movement, function as ability/ disability and physiotherapy theory and practice with a special focus on knowledge expressed, developed and shared in clinical practices.

<u>Dr Mershen Pillay</u> is South African audiologist and speech therapist, and an Associate Professor based at the University of KwaZulu-Natal. His research/interest areas include: swallowing disability, occupational-related ototoxic hearing loss, professional development. He is focussed on transforming rehabilitation practitioner's responses to disability as a social and political practice. Mershen works closely with colleagues from related professions such as physiotherapy and occupational therapy, to engage professional transformation within a critical science, decolonization framework.

<u>Prof Harsha Kathard</u> is currently acting Deputy Dean at the Faculty of Health Sciences at the University of Cape Town. She has previously been Head of Department of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences and Health Sciences Education. She is Professor of Communication Sciences and Disorders. Her research areas include education, communication and service delivery.

Speakers:

<u>Dr Dave Nicholls</u> is an Associate Professor at AUT University in Auckland, New Zealand. He is a physiotherapist, lecturer, researcher and writer, with a passion for critical thinking in and around the physical therapies. Dave is the founder of the Critical Physiotherapy Network, and has taught in the UK and New Zealand for over 20 years and has published and presented widely. In August 2017, his book *The End of Physiotherapy* will be published by Routledge.

<u>Dr Barbara E Gibson</u> is an Associate Professor in the Department of Physical Therapy, University of Toronto; and a Senior Scientist at the Bloorview Research Institute at the Holland Bloorview Kids Rehabilitation Hospital in Toronto, Canada. She holds the Bloorview Children's Hospital Foundation Chair in Childhood Disability Studies. Barbara's research investigates how social, cultural, and institutional practices intersect in producing health, inclusion/exclusion, and identity with disabled children and youth. Her book *Rehabilitation: A Post-Critical Approach* is published by CRC Press.

<u>Dr Nicky Wilson</u> is a consultant physiotherapist at King's College Hospital in London and a lecturer in physiotherapy at the University of Southampton, UK. Her clinical expertise lies in the field of musculoskeletal disorders and she has a particular interest in holistic assessment and interventions to meet the needs of a changing population. Nicky's research focusses on modernisation of the healthcare workforce and she has recently completed her PhD investigating the effect of health policy on professional boundaries.

Chair/speaker:

<u>Dr Jenny Setchell</u> is currently a Postdoctoral Fellow at the University of Queensland (Australia) and the Bloorview Research Institute, Holland Bloorview Kids Hospital, The University of Toronto (Canada). She is co-chair and co-founder of the Critical Physiotherapy Network. Her research interests include post-structural and new material perspectives on healthcare broadly, and physiotherapy specifically. Her PhD was in psychology and investigated weight stigma in health. Clinically, Jenny has worked extensively and in diverse settings as a physiotherapist. She has also been an acrobat and a human rights worker.
